

Because the number of members has been decreasing, and members are aging since the establishment of the Region, we are working on the "Change! 2022" campaign to increase the number of members to 1,246 by the end of 2022.

We are also studying the incorporation of the Region in the hope that it will improve our credibility, visibility and governance, which will also lead to an increase in membership. We and our environment are constantly changing. We want to contribute to the development of YMI by adapting to and anticipating "Changes". "Let's Enjoy Changes."

HISTORY OF JAPAN EAST REGION

Japan East Region was established on July 1, 1997, geographically dividing the Japan Region into the Japan East and the Japan West Regions. This idea of the division emerged as the solution to the problems with organizational growth such as rigidification and poor communication during the development of Y'sdom in Japan in the 1970s and afterwards.

The Regional Council Meeting in 1987 approved the establishment of the District Divisional Review Committee, and preparations for the division began, with the establishment of the East and West sub-Districts in 1993. In January 1995, amidst the embers of the Great Hanshin-Awaji Earthquake, the Regional Council finally approved the division.

The basic policy of the newly born Japan East Region was to focus on the empowerment of the Districts. To cut costs, the Region scaled down to a "small cabinet," making the District Governor's role and responsibilities comparable to those of the Regional Director until then.

When Japan East Region established in 1997, there were seven Districts, 57 Clubs with 1,246 members. Since then, the number of Clubs increased slightly, but the membership continued to decline. Feeling the sense of crisis about it, the Region launched the "2000 Project" campaign in 2008 to increase the number of members to 2,000. As one of the outcomes, in November 2009, Okinawa Club was born with 107 members.

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In 2010, Japan East Region hosted the 69th International Convention in Yokohama with 1,275 participants and adopted the "Yokohama Declaration" aiming for YMI to become carbon neutral.

On March 11, 2011, the Great East Japan Earthquake struck the Tohoku area (the northeastern part of Japan East Region). It caused the most devastating damage in Japanese natural disaster history, including the collapse of the Fukushima Nuclear Power Plant due to the tsunami, a seismic sea wave.

Japan East Region immediately set up the Support and Countermeasures Office and started support activities for the affected areas together with the YMCA. This support activity led to the establishment of Greater Ishinomaki Club in 2016 in Miyagi Prefecture, one of the severely affected prefectures. Nearly ten years have passed from then. We continue to provide close support to the affected areas.



In July 2019, Japan East Region hosted the 28th Asia Pacific Area Convention in Sendai, the capital of Miyagi Prefecture, where 811 participants learned a lot about the threats of the earthquake and tsunami as well as the challenges of reconstruction.

A major project for the Region in recent years was the revision of the Regional Constitution. It was revised once in 2003 after the establishment, but in 2014 a working team was set up to review to make it more in line with the changing times and to make it compatible with previous amendments of the International Constitution. It was discussed in each District, approved by the Regional Council meeting, reviewed by the YMI's Constitution Review Committee, and approved by the International Council Meeting. The revised Constitution came into effect in July 2018.

The first Area Presidents from Japan East Region since the Region was established was Akihiko Nara (Tokyo-Hachiouji YMC) from 1999 to 2000, and, during his term, the 18th Asia Area Convention was held in Tokachi, Hokkaido.

The following Area Presidents from the Region were Hirotoshi Fujii (Tokyo-Koto YMC) from 2007 to 2008, Kazuhiko Takata (Then Yokohama YMC, now Chiba West YMC) from 2010 to 2011, and Hiroyuki Tanaka (Then Tokyo YMC, now Tokyo-Tama-Minami YMC) from 2018 to 2020. Fujii also served as International President in 2010–2011.

The current state of Japan East Region as of November 1, 2020, is 61 Clubs with 847 members. The "Change! 2022" campaign has been implemented to increase membership to 1,246 by December 2022, which is the number of members at the time of the establishment of Japan East Region.

VITALITY IN THE FUNDRAISING

One of the distinctive Club activities in the Japan East Region is the creation of a Club fund through the sales of local products. Tokachi Club which was chartered in 1977, inspired by the fact that Tokachi area is a major producer of potatoes, started the "Potato Fund" to sell potatoes to the Clubs around the country and use the profit to support CS activities and YMCA. This year it shipped 137 tons of potatoes and 21 tons of pumpkins to 51 Clubs country wide and churches. The unique feature of this fund is that the clubs that buy the potatoes and pumpkins in large lots can resell them and turn them into a fund for their Club activities.

Matsumoto Club sells the shaddock and gives the profit to the winners of speech contest to support privately funded students from Asia as scholarships. This year is the 22nd year of this activity. So far, various other Clubs have sold local products, including salmon, apples, cherries, honey, wine, sweet potatoes, pears, tea, dried horse mackerel, etc., making it look like "Y's Men's Department Store". It can be said that these items have been enriching the dining table of Y's Men's family.




THE ACTIVE ROLE OF FEMALE MEMBERS

Women's membership in Y's Men International was admitted in 1974. Incidentally, women's membership in Lions Club and Rotary Club, which are also international service organizations, was recognized in 1987 and 1989, respectively, which means that YMI accepted women more than ten years earlier than those organizations. The first female member in Japan was inducted in 1974. The number of female members seems to be increasing gradually, not only in Japan but also in other countries. Looking at the success of women members in Japan East Region, three women have served as RD in the 24 years since the Region was established.


Also, 15 women have served as District Governor, and 12 women have served as Regional Board Officers. The 2013–2014 fiscal year, in particular, was a year in which three of the seven DGs and three of four RSDs were women. In May 2003, the all-women's club "Tokyo Tampopo Y Service Club" was born, and in 2006, "Yokohama-Tsuzuki Y's Men & Women's Club" was born.


According to the data at the start of this term, in six clubs, the majority of members are women, and about 22% of the entire Japan East Region is female members. Incidentally, the percentage of female members is steadily increasing, as it was 17.4% in 2011–2012. Besides, Y's Menettes are also active, supporting Y's Men's Club activities in each Club and District. As one of the Regional projects of Y's Menettes, they have been offering picture books to YMCA's early childhood education facilities.

MUSIC-LOVING JAPAN EAST REGION

In addition to the "Y's Men's Hymn" which we sing at the beginning of various Y's gatherings, in our Region, four of the seven Districts have a "District Song" which they sing at District Convention or District Council Meetings. Some clubs also have a Club Song or a favorite song and sing it at the end of their meetings.

Some clubs have a "Singing Gathering" for the elderly people in the community where they sing, under a song leader, nursery rhymes that they sang in their childhood.

After the Great East Japan Earthquake, some clubs have been delivering the programs to nursing homes in the affected areas. Some clubs hold a charity concert every year. Tokyo-Machida-Smiling Club and Yokohama-Tsurumi Club, both chartered in 2019, were founded by many music-loving members and are engaged in music-related service activities.



WITH THE YOUTH

The **"Youth Volunteer Leaders Forum"** began in 1987 as a joint program of three Districts in what is now Japan East Region. It was welcomed at that time because there was no opportunity for youth leaders active in each YMCA to communicate and educate each other with leaders of other YMCAs.

In 1997, when Japan East Region started, it became all-District joint sponsorship and became a forum covering the entire Region. Currently, it is hosted by Japan East Region for two nights and three days, with lectures, hands-on experience and group discussions planned and organized by YMCA staff. Y's Men and Women also have time to make a speech. About 30 youth leaders participate every year, and all the clubs of the Region provide financial support for this forum.

Also, we cooperated with the youth club's activity to collect pull-tabs of aluminum beverage cans to obtain wheelchairs, which we took over as a Regional project and donated wheelchairs to welfare facilities every year. Since 2011, the "Open Forum Y" has been held. It is a forum for the youth who have various needs such as domestic and international cooperation, humanitarian aid, NGOs, and social entrepreneurship to learn from each other, to make friends to realize their dreams together, and to think about concrete ways to do so.



SOON TO BE TEN YEARS SINCE THE GREAT EAST JAPAN EARTHQUAKE

SUMMARY OF THE GREAT EAST JAPAN EARTHQUAKE

The earthquake that struck off the southeast coast of the Oshika Peninsula in Miyagi Prefecture on March 11, 2011, caused a massive tsunami. Both the earthquake and tsunami caused enormous damage in recorded history around Japan.

The earthquake and tsunami caused catastrophic damage to the Pacific coast of the Tohoku and Kanto regions, which was accompanied by the collapse of the Fukushima Nuclear Power Plant No.1. The number of victims is 15,899 dead, 2,528 missing, and 3,739 earthquake-related deaths (as of November 30, 2020, as announced by the government).

STATUS OF RECONSTRUCTION

Public infrastructure restoration work is mostly completed in the earthquake and tsunamiaffected areas, and people are moving out of temporary housing and into permanent housing such as public housing. The local population is declining and aging, and new community problems are emerging.

In the nuclear disaster-affected areas of Fukushima, most of the evacuation orders have been lifted except for the difficult areas to return to, and the government is implementing various policies for the reconstruction and revitalization of the areas. However, the number of returning residents is still less than 5% of the pre-disaster number in many places.

RECONSTRUCTION SUPPORT ACTIVITIES OF YMCA AND Y'S MEN'S CLUBS

Immediately after the earthquake, YMCA set up three volunteer support centers in Miyako City, Iwate Prefecture, Ishinomaki City and Sendai City Miyagi Prefecture, and YMCA and Y's Men's Clubs sent a total of 15,000 volunteers to the center and continued its support activities. We appreciate very much the support and encouragement from YMCAs and Y's Men's Clubs around the world until now.

FUTURE CHALLENGES AND OUR EFFORTS

At present, less than 10% of the volunteer organizations working in the affected areas are active compared to at its peak. Many people in the affected areas are still reeling from the disaster's physical and emotional distress.

While the memories of the disaster are fading, some children have grown up not remembering the tragedy. And now, the COVID-19 pandemic has a tremendous impact on local small to medium enterprises.

We will continue to work with YMCA to give something back to those who lost their lives in the disaster and minimize the damage caused by the various natural disasters around the world by telling our real situation in the affected areas, at home and abroad.

CLUB SERVICE ACTIVITIES UNDER COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Activities at various Clubs have been limited due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Club regular meetings have been held in multiple ways; meeting in small groups, in large groups for a short time without food, on Zoom or hybrid platform.

In previous years, CS events such as ski camps, sports events, walks, speech contests, and concerts have been held, but this year these events have been cancelled or are under consideration.

Some points must be noted when performing CS activities under the pandemic; child support, poverty issues, youth/international student/senior support, disaster area support, and YMCA services.

As to child support, a lot of attention was paid to sporting events, truancy support, placement support, and children's cafeterias before the pandemic. Now, problems of needy households became apparent little by little. The problem is that, apparently, disadvantaged families cannot be identified. Some Clubs have begun to work with YMCA and other organizations to support children in difficulty.

As to youth and international student support, some Clubs made and distributed hand-made masks by volunteers, and other Clubs provided food assistance under the pandemic.

For senior support, we used to provide singing gathering and exercise opportunities, but many Clubs have been inactive due to the pandemic. Some Clubs are exploring new ways of delivering services using the Zoom platform or online system, while other Clubs have resumed their walking programs in the autumn.

Some Clubs have also started support YMCAs utilizing online systems such as crowdfunding application to support youth leaders, in addition to the traditional fundraising and participation in collaborative projects.

As to the newly started "Week4Waste" campaign, we cannot get together as a Club, but the Region is encouraging environmental beautification on an individual basis, which we would like to connect to the upcoming YMI Cleanup Week in April 2021.

CHARTER PRESENTATION CEREMONY OF CHIBA-WEST CLUB

The Charter Presentation Ceremony of Chiba-West Club's was held at Asakusabashi Hulic Conference Hall, Tokyo, on October 3, 2020. This new Club was born as part of the Japan East Region "Change! 2022" project.

The Ceremony was held on the occasion of the District Convention of Kantotobu District convened by DG Keiki Kakinuma with 66 participants. The COVID-19 pandemic forced the participants to wash their hands to disinfect and wear masks as a preventive measure against infection. The number of participants was limited to 50% of the seating capacity, and the seats were arranged in the checkerboard pattern to avoid denseness.

A hand-maid splash-proof transparent vinyl curtain was installed for MC, two microphones were prepared for greeting guests, each of which was disinfected after every use, and clean paper microphone covers were replaced every time. Banquet was held back, and only an individual lunch box was served. The Club was inaugurated with eight charter members (CP: Kazuhiko Takata, PAP) to become the 61st Club in the Region and the 11th Club in the District.





INCORPORATION OF THE REGION

The study of the incorporation of the Japan Region under Japanese law began in 1992. However, in 1997 the Region was divided into Japan East and Japan West Regions, and the study was carried over to the respective Regions.

Japan East Region resumed the study in 2012–2013, which continued for several years but was suspended. A committee to research the incorporation was set up in March 2019, and, after a series of detailed studies, it proposed incorporation of the Region as a 'General Incorporated Association' without altering the present Regional Constitution.

In response to this, a Special Committee mainly consisting of Regional Board Officers to deal with the preparation of the incorporation was newly set up at Regional Board Meeting in November 2020, aiming legal register after the approval at Regional Council Meeting which will be held in June 2021.

We expect our social credibility and recognition will increase by having a corporate status, making it easier to carry out activities that meet the needs of society and community, and leading to membership increase. We also expect the improvement of transparency and governance of our organization by meeting the legal requirements.

CHANGE! 2022 PROJECT



In 2018, the Regional Board of Japan East Region adopted a plan to "develop a mid-term membership drive to be completed in 2022." The project will run until December 2022, and the target number of members is **1,246**, which is the number at the time of the establishment of Japan East Region in 1997. RSD-EMC recruited new members for the project, and a mid-term membership development project, named after a public application in the Region, "**Change! 2022**" started.

Japan East Y's Men's Fund (JEF) provided USD 27,000 for the activity. Also, "Expanded Extension Committee" was organized, and its project plan was prepared with the participation of the Extension Committee Chairperson of each District and DSDs-MC.

OUTLINE OF "CHANGE! 2022" PROJECT

- Promotion of chartering new Clubs with five or more members. Building a new Y's Men's Club image
- Support for the establishment of new Clubs through the activities of the District Extension Committee
- Dissemination of information through Social Networking Service (currently about 30 Clubs have set up their Facebook Page)
- Creation of brochure for the establishment of new Clubs
- Publication of monthly "Change! 2022 News"
- EMC questionnaire for Clubs and members
- EMC Symposium



EMC SYMPOSIUM (GROUP DISCUSSION)

The answer to one of the EMC questionnaires, "What is it that you want from Y's Men's Club?" showed that 90% of the members want services, 50% socializing, 40% self-improvement, 29% where they feel like belonging and 9% social status. The challenges facing us were: declining membership, aging members, low recognition, the financial burden on members, uncomfortable meeting programs, unattractive meetings, and lack of attractive CS activities. After considering these issues, "Change! 2022 Action Plan" was made.

This Action Plan and "Activity Report" of Kofu 21 Club, the most active Club in the Region, were used as subjects for group discussion at the EMC Symposium held in February 2020 to raise awareness about EMC. Currently, not only Club regular meetings but also the Y' Men's Clubs' activities themselves are almost impossible to carry out due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Because of this situation, we have made "Action Plan II". And also, we have introduced meetings by Zoom, a grant program for establishing new Clubs (to new and sponsoring Clubs), and an "Anniversary Present Plan" to introduce prospective members who live near the Clubs celebrating their anniversary by 2022.

The project to incorporate the Region has also begun. We must keep good communication among our members so that low motivation under the COVID-19 pandemic does not lead to a decrease in membership.



HOW CAN WE BUILD STRONGER PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN YMCA AND Y'S MEN'S CLUBS?

In October 2017 a special committee was formed to strengthen the partnership between YMCA and Y's Men's Clubs in Japan. Since then, we have met twice a year for discussion on how to strengthen the partnership between YMCA and Y's Men's Clubs.

The members include six Y's Men leaders from Japan East and Japan West Regions, and three leaders from National YMCA and myself as a Y's Men liaison to YMCA. We meet twice a year, for two days each time and discuss openly about partnership building. However, I feel that there is a stumbling block somewhere because whatever we discussed for an action plan did not make any progress in reality. Why not? I wonder.

This year, because of Covid19, we have decided to meet through zoom, maybe every 2 or 3 months instead of face to face meetings twice a year. In this process, we came to understand that many YMCAs in Japan also have difficult issues due to the financial problems caused by Covid19 pandemic. At that time we realized that YMCA should focus on the "Post Corona" issues in their own community.

Because YMCAs, especially in big cities & local YMCAs have faced a huge loss financially during the period of Covid19 it is too difficult for them to think of doing anything new. Many of the big YMCAs or unstable YMCAs were in this position, even before the Corona crisis in Japan.

YMCAs which were focusing on child care facilities, after school program, camps and welfare programs for the frail elderly, should see this moment as an opportunity to shift the services and programs toward more fitting and suitable needs of the vulnerable population.

The YMCAs may need to change their working style and work more closely with local government, local organizations and companies as well as seeking more collaboration with other similar service organizations. Here Y's Men's Clubs could be a partner for the community with YMCA.

Y's Men's Clubs now see this as an opportunity to offer the voluntary time and financial assistance for the community through YMCAs.

This is a time to discuss the new community programs jointly by YMCA and Y's Men's Clubs.

Through this shift, both organizations will find new roles in the changing community.





HISTORY AS A LEADERSHIP TOOL

We are the only service organization who has a special partnership with the world's longest serving and largest youth organization – the YMCA. Our mission is anchored on Christ's teachings. We serve selflessly. These facts should be reasons enough to be proud as Y's Men.

Nearly a hundred years since 1922, our organization has grown remarkably; from a meager fifteen, led by our founder, Judge Paul William Alexander to today's around 26,000 membership. Along with this growth however, comes the challenge to adapt to the changing global atmosphere amid an alarming pandemic.

Yes, we hear comments that "there's no need to dwell on the past; what matters is the future."

Yet, as time evolves, only documented History as a reference tool, can tell us how we have moved along and how we may do better; it helps us determine how we shall move forward.

The question now is - how much attention have we given to our History or how mindful are we to the need of consolidating our Area records?

In her 12 September 2020 Memo, ISD/PAP Debbie Redmond disclosed that "many people complained about the History book written for the 75th Anniversary since they didn't think it was Global; yet not enough information had been provided to make it more Global". So, she echoed an appeal; that "any significant dates, any photos (past and present) and additional information would be greatly appreciated".

I do not doubt that the ASP Area has many good stories to tell and voluminous achievements to pride ourselves through the years. Noting the importance of History, AP David Lua is determined to have the history of our Asia Pacific Area documented.

The use of history explains how an organization can utilize its past; showing us how previous generations of leaders confronted and responded to challenges and opportunities.

The job of leaders, is to inspire and devise smart strategies for the future.

Great leaders respect and honor the basic truth that to lead with a sense of history and to acknowledge its power is not to be a slave to the past. While they may not view themselves as historians, they find it useful to reminiscence the past; doing so, establish a place in history.

The great historian of business strategy and organization Alfred D. Chandler Jr. was never tired of asking his colleagues, "How can you know where you're going if you don't know where you've been?" In other words, "Look Back to Plan Forward".

I challenge every member of this team - be active in sharing your Region's legacy and let the "aha moment" of your work this year be a part of history; it could help provide a guiding pathway for our Area in generations to come.

We could find clear explanation in the Constitution and Guidelines of the International Association of Y's Men's Clubs. It stated that "based on the Teachings of Jesus Christ" means that club members acknowledge what Jesus Christ has taught, and are willing to live out those teachings. This should guide members in their decisions on the operation model of Y's men's projects to build a better society.

As Taiwanese, we often think of "Instruction" when we talk about "Teaching". However, the International Constitution and Guidelines, refers to teachings not only about instructions in a passive manner, but includes action. Let me share three "Teachings of Jesus Christ" in the Bible.

1. Serve others with humility

The story of Jesus washing the feet of His disciples is an excellent example of servant leadership. Jesus said to his disciples: "whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be your slave –just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Matthew 20: 26– 28, NIV).

Jesus did what he taught. He knelt down and washed his disciples' feet. This was the example of serving people. He teaches us to be humble, speak with gentleness and kindness, to love and to build up one another.

2. Forgiveness

During crucifixion, when Jesus was insulted, mocked and humiliated, He said, "Father, forgive them! Because they do not know what they are doing" (Luke 23:34).

3. Love your neighbor and your enemies

Jesus taught us not to respond with "Eye for an eye, and tooth for a tooth". He said: "If someone strikes you on the right cheek, turn to him the other also; if someone wants to sue you and take your tunic, let them have your cloak as well; if anyone forces you to go one mile, go with them two miles; give to the one who asks you, and do not turn away from the one who wants to borrow from you". (Matthew 5:38–42). He also not only taught us to love our neighbors, but also our enemies and pray for those who persecute us.

Jesus inspired us to be the doers of His Word, not only hearers. The mission of Y's Men's Clubs is to encourage members to make Jesus' teachings alive. These fundamental principles are to guide fellow Y's Men in decision-making, project implementation and be a living witness through the individual's life.

I sincerely invite all veteran Y's Men to affirm Jesus' Teachings to bless others in our service as Y's Men. I hope that together, this Y's Men Movement will make our society a better one.



"CHRISTIAN EMPHASIS IS NOT CHRISTIANITY."

I sincerely hope that this will be an opportunity to reflect with you on the Christian emphasis that guides our work.

1. "Emphasis before the Christian Emphasis"

We live in a multicultural society. Based on human history, culture, and religion developed in various parts of the world, human rights, gender and environmental factors have been added since modern times.

While the former values are often found in groups (communities) such as families, ethnic groups, and nations, the latter values are found in more fragmented individuals. First, it is important to emphasize that we are a social service organization rooted in these diverse values.

We are also a social service organization and an action organization at the same time. Specifically, we are an action organization that supports the YMCA movement and works to realize its ideals through its support. The emphasis on Christianity is not an inherent value of Y's Men's Clubs, but rather a value rooted in the YMCA movement. Hence, its support group, Y's Men's Clubs, will also need to have an understanding of this. The second point to be emphasized is that the reason for the Christian emphasis amid diverse values is the values held by the YMCA.

2. "Christian Emphasis - Christianity, Human History, and the Reformation"

The Christian emphasis is to learn the values that Christianity has created with the development of humanity and adapt them to today. For example, the calendar we use in our daily life is the western calendar. The calendar counts the birth of Christ as the initial year. Whether you are a Christian or not, humans have already accumulated 2,000 years of history using the popularized western calendar to count the years.

In the nearly 1,500 years leading up to Luther's Reformation, Europe grew up in a culture with the Catholic Church as the state religion. The Protestant churches that emerged after the Reformation meant that the churches were formed by people who issued protestations (= Protestatio) against the Catholic Church. This is not an internal schism within Christianity. It was a movement that goes back to the establishment of Christianity, or to reclaim the original Christianity.

The situation in Europe just before the Reformation had been heightened by disease, conflict, and unstable politics, including a plague epidemic and a church schism with two popes a century or so earlier, which caused people to be unsettled. It was a time when even those who lived peaceful lives did not know when they might suddenly lose their livelihood and, in the worst case, die.

The indirect solution to this anxiety, which could not be resolved directly, was the letter of redemption. People bought it, hoping to save the souls of their dead relatives, hoping that eventually they too would be saved from the misery of this world. But the root of the anxiety is not resolved. In a situation where the value of human beings, their valuable lives, was neglected, even if the system was excellent, it could not fundamentally raise the value of human beings and give them a valuable life. The Reformation, hoping for the return of the era in which Jesus lived, reshaped the valuable life that early Christianity had given people. Just as Jesus reconstructed the Jewish teachings, traditions, and culture of his time to help people discover a life of value.

3. "Christian Emphasis: A Look at Founder George Williams"

The reason I wrote about the Reformation is to make the connection here. George Williams was first baptized in the Church of England and became a Christian. Later he converted to the Congregational Church. The Congregational Church is the Reformation in England. The Congregational Church is characterized by political independence from worldly authorities, such as kingship, and self-government by individual believers in a collegial system. Independence and autonomy are the decision-making tools of a mature individual who is responsible for his or her own well-thought-out decisions. The Bible describes this value system as freedom. Thus, it embodies the values of early Christianity.

4. "Christian emphasis is not Christianity"The definition of Jesus' teachings of love fully means respect for the individual and that unknown individuals who have become known for their value because of their appeal to Jesus are connected through him. The YMCA movement started by George Williams is not a gathering of Christians of different faiths, but rather a group of Christians who have come to know a valuable life through Jesus and are united in the values embodied by Jesus beyond their faith to realize a valuable life.

5. About the Christian Emphasis Project in the Asia Pacific Region

I will be filming and publishing a video from a sermon I give at my home church, and I will also be writing a column on Christianity as well as this one in the Area Bulletin.

6. The Christian Emphasis Project of Y's Men International

There is news by the International Service Director for Christian Emphasis about the International Projects with an emphasis on Christianity. Luther's Reformation is mentioned. I will share it with you as soon as possible.
